Greetings to all in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

The Post - pandemic Era is facing many chaos and struggles due to war, starvation, and poverty. All over the world, we are expecting peace and comfort to overcome this desperate and pathetic situation. In this context our theme "Majestic Manger" is very relevant to address all these issues. The birth of Christ was not the ordinary birth of an ordinary man. It was the birth of the most unique person in history. The birth of Jesus Christ was the incarnation of God Himself. Church Father Athanasius' view of incarnation is, "God became man that man might become God."

In Luke 2: 7 we read, "And she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in clothes and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them." When the angel appeared to the shepherds in the field to invite them to visit the new-born King, he told them to look for a baby in a manger. *Manger* comes from the Latin word for *chew* or *eat*. It refers to a trough where horses and donkeys and cattle ate.

Manger was Majestic because Jesus was born there. He is fully divine and fully human. In other words, Jesus has two distinct natures: divine and human. Jesus is the Word who was God and was with God and was made flesh (John 1:1, 14). Jesus Christ's presence changed the whole universe up and down. His incarnation introduced a new order, it was entirely different from the existing system. He reinterpreted the meaning of power, authority, majesty etc. Traditional kings must be born in a palace, but this king's birthplace is a manger. It teaches us the importance of humility, openness, and accommodation.

The manger is a sign of humility. It embodies a profoundly moving truth: that on his first night on this earth, the King of Glory, the Son of God, slept in a manger where the animals fed. What a picture of God's desire to identify with the humble and the poor. 'Away in a manger with no crib for a bed, the little Lord Jesus lay down His sweet head, the stars in the sky look down where He lay, the little Lord Jesus asleep on the hay'.

In Phil. 2: 7 - 8 we read "He made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself." "God became man and took on flesh. The Creator became a creature; the One who hung the stars lay helpless in a manger. The One who we teach our children is so big, so strong, and so mighty became so tiny, so weak, and so powerless. The King of the angels was made a little lower than the angels. The Creator of time entered time. The One whose everlasting arms are underneath His people lay vulnerable in his mother's arms."

The manger is a sign of openness and accommodation. A stall of some sort, filled with hay or straw with a cow here, a few sheep over there, and a donkey laying down. Wise men are bowing as they present their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, as the shepherds take note of the whole scene, having been told by the angel and led by the star up above. His birthplace is open to entire creation, there was no discrimination among the creation, that place is to open to accommodate, haves and haves – nots, biotic and abiotic.

The manger wasn't just a sign for the shepherds; it's a sign to all of us that Jesus is accessible to everyone who seeks Him. The shepherds would not have had access to a baby born in a royal palace, and as strangers, they probably wouldn't even have had access to a baby born in the confines of a family home. But a manger was accessible to all—and still is. Amid this crowded scene, we find Mary and Joseph beholding Baby Jesus lying in a manger as the centrepiece. If we are ready to receive Christ in our lives, we will also be blessed with his love and peace.

We will have Holy Communion service at 8.00am in English, followed by a fellowship breakfast.


8. Watch Night/New Year Service

The Majestic Manger

"As a baby in a manger, As a star to warm the night As a song to fill our silent hearts, As a voice of love and light As a healer sent from heaven, As a lamb to take our sin, As a royal risen Savior, Lord you left your throne & your golden crown for me in great humility How majestic is the manger that brought wonder to the night Lord come to my heart, there's room in my heart for Thee"

The above lyrics is an excerpt from the song that our choir would be using to worship our Lord in this year's Carol service. The word Manger comes from the Latin word for chew or eat. It refers to a trough where horses and donkeys and cattle eat from. A lowly dirty manger was made majestic with the birth of God in human form.

The manger :

1. was predestined place to be - according to the Old Testament prophesies. I have thought several times on why Jesus could not have been born earlier. Perfect parents, perfect timing, perfect place to upbring and many more could have been the factors by which it took time.

- 2. was a sign given to the shepherds to rejoice the birth of the King. The shepherds were instrumental in spreading the news of the birth of the King and they had to be given a sign to follow.
- 3. signifies humility and love of our God who left his throne for us. What does he see in us to leave his throne and come to the earth.
- 4. brings forth remission of sins & grace into our lives without which our lives would be busy performing sacrifices for every sin that's committed. The manger is an invitation for us to open our hearts and create room for the King.

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth *peace among those with whom he is pleased*! (Luke 2:14)



Majestic Manger

As all of you may know, Jesus was born in a manger in Bethlehem. Luke 2:7 says, "And she brought forth her firstborn Son, and wrapped Him in swaddling clothes, and laid Him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." But why was He born in a manger? Does the manger have any spiritual meaning to it? In the Gospels it is written that Jesus was born in a manger because the inn in Bethlehem where they sought shelter did not have any available rooms and the only other option they had was the manger in a stable. The word 'manger' is also mentioned many times in the Gospel of Luke. This is unusual and should lead us to ask why. Why does Luke feel it important to tell us about where Jesus was born?

- The first reason is to show that Jesus' birth was humble, lowly and that He did not have the privilege to be born in an inn or a hospital like most of us. Instead, He was born in a manger.
- The manger is a feeding trough for cattle. In the bible, Jesus says that He is bread of life and whoever comes to him will never be hungry. This brings me to my next point which is, the reason why Jesus was born in a manger, a feeding trough, is because it was a sign of what Jesus came to do which is to offer Himself as bread to 'feed' our souls spiritually. In other words, He came to satisfy our spiritual hunger, something that cannot be satisfied in any other way except through Him.
- The manger is a sign that Jesus is accessible to everyone. In the bible it says that the angels invited the shepherds to see baby Jesus, the newborn king. The shepherds would not have had access to a royal

baby born in a palace. Hence, since Jesus was born in a manger, the shepherds were able to see him. Therefore, the manger that Jesus was born in signifies that He is accessible to people from all walks of life

Why is the manger referred to as majestic?

- One reason is because 'majestic' in 'majestic manger' means exalted, which means someone who is of a higher status or has special abilities. Isaiah 7:14 says "Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." What does 'Immanuel' mean? 'Immanuel' is a Hebrew word which translates to 'God with us'. This reveals that the baby that was born in the manger was not an ordinary human being like you and me but, He was God who came into this world for the redemption of our sins and to heal those who are suffering. Therefore, He is majestic.
- Another reason why Jesus is majestic is because He is compassionate and can sympathise with us. This is because He through the humiliating experience of being born, being helpless and fully dependent on His parents even though He is God. His earthly life included growing up, learning obedience and going through the difficulties of puberty. Hence, He was like us in every respect. Hence, He can sympathize with us as we go through the same challenges and temptations. Hebrew 4:15 says "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin." Therefore, He is majestic.

Therefore, in conclusion, Jesus is majestic. He is compassionate and He sympathises with us. His birth in the manger emphasizes his humility. Jesus is the bread of life and he will satisfy our spiritual hunger. Therefore, we must consistently pray to Him that we may be fulfilled spiritually as the only way we can satisfy our hunger is through Him. In addition, we must also remember that all of us are accepted by Jesus and He is accessible to all of us. We must also not forget Christmas is not only about Santa, presents or tasty food but it is about the birth of Jesus Christ who came to our world in humility for the redemption of our sins.


"Who are you?" he called out, bewildered.
